The movie "Silent Hill" is a Canadian-French horror film released in 2006. The screenplay was written by Christophe Gans, Roger Avary and Nicolas Boukhrief and directed by Christophe Gans. It is a covenantal legal term closely associated with ransom, atonement, substitution, and deliverance, thus salvation. Theologically, redemption refers ultimately to the saving work of Christ, who came to accomplish our redemption by giving his life in substitution for our own as the ransom price" (Duncan). This article elaborates on the theme of redemption in the movie "Silent Hill" concerning the character Alessa. The movie "Silent Hill" is an adaptation of Konami's survival horror video game series "Silent Hill." The movie was released on April 21, 2006. The film contains horror, emotional and religious concerns. The movie is about a woman who goes in search of her daughter and fights with the local cult and zombies to rescue her daughter. "Silent Hill" follows the story of Rose Da Silva, a mother who takes her adopted daughter, Sharon, to the town of Silent Hill in search of answers about Sharon's past and her recurring nightmares.

As they arrive, Rose and Sharon become separated, and Rose embarks on a journey through the foggy and eerie town to find her daughter. The notion of redemption and the peaceful rest of the soul after an act of shedding innocent blood is a concept that resonates with classical beliefs as well as biblical themes. In the case of Alessa in Silent Hill, her soul finds redemption through a sacrificial act, drawing parallels to the redemptive power of Jesus's blood in Christian theology.
